As anticipated in our last newsletter, building work on the new Bible translation department at TCNN is finally underway! On 28<sup>th</sup> Jan, the college community gathered for prayers to

dedicate the project to the Lord, and the following day, the picks and shovels started swinging as work began in earnest. It has been exciting watching the daily progress, and as you can see below, the ground floor is now virtually complete. The first phase (walls and roof) should be finished by October, at which time work will stop until more funding becomes available. Further overseas funding is dependent upon the Nigerian church raising their share (one third). So far money has been coming in in trickles, but the fact that work has started has prompted a few donations, including one from the current translation students, even though some of them will graduate before the building is ready to use.
